| Course Objectives | The course "Introduction to Adult Education: theoretical and practical approaches" aims to familiarize students with the broader field of Adult Education, studying the theoretical framework, current trends and recent research findings. The course will critically explore questions such as the following, combining theoretical knowledge with active learning, critical thinking and reflection on experience: • How is the field of adult education defined and reshaped over time? • What is the role of adult education in the age of information and lifelong learning? What skills are required? • How is adult education in Greece and Cyprus shaping up compared to other European countries? What are the main features of adult education and lifelong learning policy? • How is adulthood defined? What are the characteristics of an adult and how do they affect adult learning and the role of the adult educator? • Which adults participate in education programmes and what potential barriers do they face? • Important typologies and models of adult learning (formal and nonformal education, work-based learning, e-learning/e-learning). What is the ideological and theoretical background of these and what are the challenges? • What are the role and (professional) characteristics of the adult educator? | | | |
